Tasks - John used to carry out a number of routine tasks that now need to be done by others, including the ones listed below. Thanks to those who have already volunteered to take on some of those tasks, as noted! Those still needing a volunteer are in bold print.

- Day-to-day:
 - Checking the church's voicemail and e-mail, and responding to (or forwarding) messages, as needed *Mardine*
 - Picking up the church's mail, and directing letters, bills, etc., to the appropriate people
 - Keeping an eye on the thermostats, and making sure that the boiler and furnace are working properly

 - Being the person to call whenever something needs to be serviced (e.g. boiler, alarm system, plumbing, etc.)

 - Unlocking the doors and turning the lights and sound system on before the service; turning the lights and sound system off and locking the sanctuary doors after the service *Margaret McN-R*
 - Locking the outside doors, and setting the alarm on Sundays, following Coffee Time
- Other:
 - Writing material for the quarterly Newsletter, and e-mailing it to Lisa
 - Sending the Newsletter out by e-mail Lisa

Tasks such as moderating Session meetings, arranging pulpit supply, responding to pastoral emergencies, and getting organized for the Annual Meeting will be the responsibility of our interim moderator, Laura Hargrove (hargrove@mymts.net).

Scripture readings and hymns will be chosen by those who provide pulpit supply each Sunday.

"Moderator" refers to the fact that she is the moderator of the Session, in the absence of a called and inducted minister, who normally is the moderator of the Session. This Past Week - A funeral service for **Donna Graham** was held in the sanctuary this past Wednesday. Donna died on the 31st of January. We again extend our sympathy to Harold and family.

Moving Out - The Session has granted John a couple of weeks after the end of December to move his things out of the minister's office. After twelve years, there are a lot of things to sort through, to dispose of, and to pack, so you may see him around the church during the week yet, this week and next.

The Christian Year - This Friday is **Epiphany**, the second of the four major festival days of the Christian Year (the others being Christmas, Easter, and Pentecost). On Epiphany, we commemorate the **visit of the Magi** (or **Wise Men**) to Jesus and his parents, as described in Matthew 2.1-12, which is the only account there is of this event. The account suggests that Jesus was as much as two years old by then. In any case, it is unlikely that the Magi arrived at the same time as the shepherds did; therefore Epiphany is celebrated as a separate festival from Christmas.

The Magi were the first Gentiles (non-Jews) to worship Jesus, and so Epiphany celebrates the fact that Jesus came into the world to benefit *all* people, not just a single ethnic group. The word epiphany itself is a Greek word meaning "manifestation", and it refers to the fact that, in Jesus, God "manifested" himself to all humanity.

Epiphany is always on **January 6**, the 12th day after Christmas Day. It originated in the Greek-speaking part of the church (in Asia and eastern Europe) in the early 300s, as a festival celebrating Jesus' birth and baptism. However, after the date for celebrating Jesus' birth was officially set at December 25, the focus of Epiphany changed. In the Greek-speaking part of the church, it became a festival celebrating Jesus' baptism and his first miracle (changing water into wine), while in the Latin-speaking part of the church (in western Europe and northern Africa), the focus of Epiphany became the visit of the Magi.

The symbolic color for Epiphany is **white**, signifying joy and celebration.
