**The Christian Year** - Today, the first Sunday after Pentecost, is **Trinity Sunday**. Unlike most festivals of the Christian Year, which commemorate significant **events**, Trinity Sunday highlights a significant Christian **doctrine** (teaching): that God is three persons in one (that is, that the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit together are God) — a uniquely Christian way of understanding God. Because the doctrine of the Trinity is so difficult to comprehend, it reminds us of God's greatness, and of the limitations of our human capacity to fully understand God.

The symbolic color for Trinity Sunday is **white**, signifying joy and celebration.

#### **Mission Moment**

In Haiti's Artibonite region, two-year-old Gloria lives with her parents and three siblings. One day, Gloria's parents noticed that their daughter would not eat, and that her breathing was laboured. They rushed Gloria to St. Marc Hospital, supported by *Presbyterian World Service & Development* and its local partner. There, Gloria was diagnosed with acute malnutrition, as well as tuberculosis and edema. Her treatment consisted of a regimen of antibiotics and therapeutic milk, administered over the course of a few weeks until she was deemed healthy enough to begin outpatient care. Not long after, Gloria had gained enough weight to assure the doctors that she had made a full recovery, both from malnutrition and tuberculosis.
